## Curiosity



Curiosity is a child's natural desire to ask questions, explore ideas, and understand how the world works. It shows itself when children wonder why something happens, how things work, or what might happen next.

Curiosity is important because it helps children become active learners rather than passive ones. Curious children are more motivated to learn, develop stronger thinking and problem-solving skills, and gain confidence in exploring new ideas. It also supports creativity, resilience, and a lifelong love of learning, helping children grow into thoughtful, independent, and adaptable individuals.

- If you could ask one question to a scientist, inventor or famous explorer, who would you choose and what would you ask them?
